Events 2012

Opening of the 2012 season, Easter Sunday and Monday 8th / 9th April

The 2012 season gets off to a flying start on Easter Sunday and Monday.

Come along and see the changes that have been put in place over the winter months. There have been more improvements to the museum over the last twelve months and lots of progress has been made with various engine projects. Notably the Stott steam



engine is now running, the Peter Brotherhood sleeve valve diesel engine is complete, the Vickers-Petter has run and its systems are currently being finished and the trailer mounted Crossley Portable has almost finished it's rebuild. Also the cut away MB275 is being prepared as a static display in the "Diesel" exhibition area.

The Craft Centre now includes a dry stone wall display, the power hammer in now driven by a Blackstone "P" Type diesel engine and the wheelwrights shop has acquired a large "blacksmith made" treadle lathe.

Also the local history group have added to the diorama depicting the Poynton of 100 years ago. They have also acquired the 1835 bell which was originally mounted in the bell tower at Poynton's Towers Yard colliery workshop and was cast at London's Whitechapel Foundry where this years Olympic Games bell was made.

After the Easter opening, the museum will then be open every Friday, Saturday, Sunday & Bank Holidays.

Demonstrations of old crafts

Bodging (the traditional craft of working with green-wood using portable tools including a pole-lathe to turn chair legs, etc) while another volunteer, will be working at the forge. The power hammer has been installed, a wheelwrights shop is under construction and a tool shed is complete. Dates for craft demonstrations are:-

Steam Days

As well as the extensive collection of Internal Combustion engines at the museum that track its development from the earliest engines through to a modern Bentley engine; we have a steam section with some interesting examples of different steam engines.

These include a Fowler Beam engine; an A frame Steam engine and a pair of Robey engines. These engines run on the 3rd Sunday of every month in the season. There is no additional charge to see the steam engines, normal museum entry applies. Museum open 10:00 - 17:00.

Art or Science 1st - 5th June

When some people think of engines they picture lumbering, smoky beasts that are functional but not worth a second glance. Others however can see the beauty and craftsmanship that goes into the curve of a flywheel or the graceful lines and precision of a piston and cylinder. Leonardo Da Vinci was one famous historical figure well known for seeing the nexus between art and engineering.

It's easy to take good engineering for granted but when done right good engineering can be beautiful to look at, or beautifully functional or just amazing in its scale. Many visitors to the museum comment on the shape and form of the engines. Photographers and artists find the place fascinating.

As part of Poynton's Jubilee Festival the museum on Anson Road is displaying paintings, sketches and etching that show the beauty of the engines and the companies that built them. We have examples of art in the main museum engine buildings; the local history area and of our Craft Centre.

Some of the drawings to be displayed are by local artist William Geldart who was commissioned by engineering company Mitchell Shackleton to capture the engines and the men who build them.

Another must see in the Local History area is the model of Poynton c1900 that has been built by the museum Volunteers and is another excellent example of precision craft that should not be missed.

The museum also has a giant model of Poynton showing how the village looked c1900. The volunteers have spent over 4000 hours bringing the miniature village to life. It's available to view and for those local to the area it is great fun working out where your house is now compared with the landscape of old collieries and railways.

largest steam engine in Cheshire - the Poynton model, craft demonstrations on the Monday and our souvenir shop will be featuring many bargains (including a half price toy sale).

Bank Holiday

There are few people who are not moved and enthralled by the sight and sound of a giant steam engine in motion. The power and majesty of the spinning flywheel ignites a passion deep inside and makes you wonder about the work and history of these industrial giants.

The Stott mill engine at the museum has been lovingly restored by our volunteers and will run on live steam for the only time this year, over the Bank Holiday Weekend. The engine has the power of 250 horses. The 10 foot flywheel is cast in iron and weighs 10 tons on its own.

Although the smaller steam engines at the museum run on the 3rd Sunday of every month during the season, the Stott engine has not been run this year and the only planned running is Sunday 26th & Monday 27th August.

There is no additional charge to see the steam engine, normal museum entry applies. Museum is open 10:00 - 17:00 Friday, Saturday, Sunday & Monday over that weekend.

On Monday 27th the Craft Centre at the museum will also be in operation. Everyone is invited along – for a great day out.

Display of Vintage Cameras

Thornton-Pickard was a famous British camera manufacturer established in 1888. The company was based in Altrincham (near Manchester) and was an early pioneer in the development of the camera industry.

Over the weekend a great many of our engines will be running, including the small steam engines. The Craft Centre will be in full swing with demonstrations by blacksmiths at the forge and wood turners/bodging at their lathes. The giant model of Poynton is a treat so do make time to drop into the local history area and talk to the volunteers who have built it. There are many pre-stocktake bargains in the shop and a giant Tombola could send you home with your arms full of presents.

The Milk Van will be on site to tempt you with bacon butties and mugs of steaming hot tea so do come and join us.

REMINDER:- Over the winter months the museum is planning to build a new storage building. To allow the ground to be cleared for the footings many of our engines in the back area of the car park have been moved down into the car parking area itself. Because of this we are going to be very constrained with the amount of room we will have available for visitors over that weekend.

The Trustees have therefore taken the decision that for the closing weekend of the year, we will not have a mini rally as such and will not be accepting visiting engines. This will allow the maximum amount of available space to be used for visitor parking.

We hope enthusiasts will understand the need for our decision on this occasion and join us again next year for our opening and closing weekends.
