#### "Turn the Clocks Back" weekend to close the season 2006

After a very successful summer season the museum will close over the winter from the end of October. The last weekend is the 28th and 29th October when the museum will host its traditional "Turn the Clocks Back" rally. The museum will be open from 10:00 - 17:00 on both days.

The museum is expecting an interesting collection of rally engines to be on display as well as a lot of interest in the parts of the huge <u>Doxford</u> engine that have already arrived at their new home. If you would like to bring an engine to the museum please contact Geoff Challinor.

It will also be the last opportunity for visitors to view the "Rattling Monsters" Exhibition. This has received praise from enthusiasts from all over the world and is also proving popular with the non-specialist visitor, as it gives a very easy explanation of engines and allows everyone to understand how these early engines work. When they are fired into life it is very easy to hear how these atmospheric engines achieved their nickname of "Rattling Monsters".

These engines, first developed in 1867 by Otto-Langen were later built in the UK by Crossley Brothers of Manchester. Among the exhibits is the largest running free piston engine in the world, complete with its original winch and a crane. The 3hp engine was built to run on Town Gas but the museum is running it on hydrogen. The museum also has a working exhibit of a 1/2 hp engine and a beautiful model (made by Wayne Grenning). It has also taken delivery of more early engines on loan from the National Museums of Scotland that further enhances this unique collection.

The full size replica of an Otto-Langen Atmospheric Free Piston engine will also be paying a visit for the weekend. This 1/4 hp engine has been lovingly built by Wayne Timms and Dave Allen, members of the museum "Friends" association. The exhibition is so good that it has been given a Heritage Award by the The Institution of Diesel and Gas Turbine Engineers (IDGTE). The Institution is an independent professional body serving the Diesel and Gas Turbine Industry as a whole. The award is in recognition of the contribution to engineering heritage in the restoration to working order of early internal combustion engines in the "Rattling Monsters" section of the museum. There will be a formal presentation of the award on Saturday 28th October at midday.

IDGTE President Trevor Owen visited the Museum on 21st June for the Midsummer Mingle event and was shown the "Rattling Monster" display. He commented "I immediately realized that this was an exceptional display from the earliest days of the internal combustion engine and that the display was worthy of consideration for our Heritage Award as a unique example of such engines in working order.".

"Having one atmospheric engine running and available for the public to enjoy is very rare" says Geoff Challinor, Curator at the museum, "to have so many of these engines available in the one place really is a world first. I am delighted that the IDGTE has recognised our efforts in this way, it is an honour to receive it."

# Les Cawley Memorial Trophy

Les, one of the museum founders, died in July four years ago. His memory and love for the Poynton Show lives on with his memorial trophy given to an exhibit in the vintage machinery section.

"He never missed the Poynton Show" said Geoff Challinor. "He had a great love of local life and could always be found at the showground, sometimes pulling trucks and engines out off the field if the rain and mud proved to be too much." Let's hope there won't be too much rain and mud this year to deter the exhibitors and visitors. As well as awarding the trophy, the museum will be represented with a stall and some of our volunteers in attendance.

#### **Exhibition on the Vernon and Warren Families**

The Warren family held the manor in Poynton until 1801 when Sir George, the last surviving male, died. He was succeeded by his daughter, Lady Warren Bulkeley. She died childless in 1826 when she left it to Frances Maria Warren, Lady Vernon.

The Lords Vernon held the estate until the final sale in 1920. Several halls were built on the site in Poynton Park, each one then demolished to make way for a new one. The last hall, Poynton Towers, was finally taken down in the 1930s.

The Warren, Anson and Vernon families have been instrumental in moulding the history of Poynton and the exhibition helps trace their connections and their influence on the town.

Open every Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Bank Holiday until the end of October. Normal admission fees apply for entry to the museum but no additional charge for the history exhibition.



# 1000 Engine Rally, Astle Park, Chelford - 24 & 25 June 2006

Once again, the Anson Engine Museum is proud to be working with the organisers of this rally to welcome exhibitors and visitors to the rally at Chelford, Cheshire.

The purpose of the Rally, when started in 1985, was to get the engine numbers to 1,000 (hence the name). This has never been achieved with just engines, but they have had more than 1,000 exhibits but still long for 1,000 stationary engines. One day, they hope to achieve their stated goal.

Since moving from Tatton Park to their present site at Astle Park, Chelford they have grown in size. As well as being a Stationary Engine Rally they try to put on a show that is suitable for all the family, young and old (and those in the middle).

This reunion is going to be a great opportunity for colleagues to get together and chat about the old days and exchange anecdotes.

# **Fathers Day Celebrations**

Visitors will be able to enjoy the impressive collection of over 200 engines, many restored to their original working condition. Over the past twelve months the museum (the volunteers and the engines) have picked up several awards from the Cheshire and Warrington Tourism Board, the Institution of Mechanical Engineers and the Inspiring Woman Award. The museum is currently running a world first exhibition of Atmospheric Gas Engines – or "Rattling Monsters". There is also a very unusual exhibition of photographs and artefacts telling the story of the Poynton Collieries.

Geoff Challinor, Chairman of the museum said "My dad encouraged my interest in engines by giving me one to restore when I was only 14. This is my opportunity to say "thanks" to dads everywhere by making it a special day here at the museum. We intend to have several of our engines running that day to make it a really special Fathers Day". If you want to join Geoff and the volunteers on Sunday June 18th, Fathers Day, pop along between 10:00 - 17:00 to see what is the largest collection of engines in the UK, and possibly in Europe, open to the public. To add to the atmosphere that day engines will be running; there is a special Fathers Day Fun Sheet and - if you bring your dad along that day - he gets in free! The small shop has a range of unusual gifts and hand made cards to make all dads and granddads feel extra special.



# **Poynton Collieries Exhibition**

In the Poynton Local History area we will be running an exhibition on the local collieries from 16 April – 23 July, every Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Bank Holidays from 10:00 - 17:00.

The Exhibition tells the rise and decline of the coalmining industry around Poynton. Although Farming was Poynton's original main occupation, coal was found near the surface of the land. Coalmining has had a profound effect on Poynton. The village would look very different if there had been no coal in the area.

By 1789, technology had advanced with the invention of engines to pump water from the workings, thus allowing deeper pits to be sunk. Output in 1789 was over 26,000 tons rising to a peak production of 243,673 tons in 1859. The collieries closed in 1935 when the economically viable coal reserves had been exhausted.

#### World First!

This 1/4 hp engine has been lovingly built by Wayne Timms and Dave Allen, members of the museum "Friends" association. They will be taking the engine over to the Nuenen rally in Holland at the end of May. We are privileged to host the first running of this magnificent engine as part of our Exhibition.

The engine will be at the museum from 13 - 27 May.

To our knowledge, there has never before been an exhibition totally devoted to Atmospheric engines. A world first – here at the Anson. No mean feat for a small museum without national funding.

## **The Rattling Monsters Exhibition**

In his book, Horst O Hardenberg describes how the Otto-Langen engine displayed at the 1867 Paris Universal Exposition was called a "rattling monster" or "devil's machine". Despite this, the engine went on to take the prestigious gold medal, beating the French built Hugon and Lenoir engines.

Crossley Brothers in Manchester went on to became the licensed manufacturer for Otto-Langen engines in the UK & Colonies. It is hailed as the first commercially successful engine

The "Rattling Monsters" exhibition tells the history and development of these engines as well allowing you the chance to see many exhibits never before made public. The museum has been working with some of this countries other leading museums to acquire engines and artefacts. The first of these engines, a 3hp Crossley Brothers Atmospheric – Free Piston engine, on loan from The Bristol Museums Galleries and Archives, will form the centrepiece of the special exhibition. Other engines of different sizes have been promised.

Exhibition runs every Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Bank Holiday from 13 May 2006 - 29 October 2006, 10:00 - 17:00.
